- Multi-tiered tray systems:** Some installations use vertical stacking with separate hangers for each tray, ensuring each tray is independently supported and meets fill and clearance requirements.
- Larger trays:** Use a single tray with sufficient width and depth to accommodate all cables while staying within fill limits.

Conclusion While physically possible in some cases, installing a cable tray inside another is not standard practice and may violate NEC requirements for accessibility, fill, and heat dissipation. The recommended approach is to use independent trays with proper support or a larger tray to safely manage cable routing.
