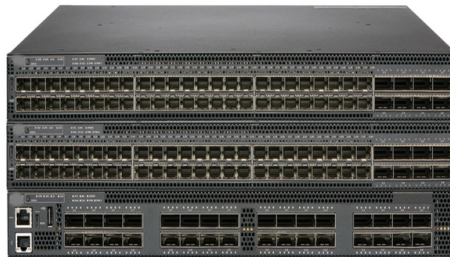


Do you still need a router with a fiber optic transceiver

The ONT may include a transceiver for optical-to-electrical conversion, but if full home network functionality is needed, a separate router is connected to the ONT to distribute the network to multiple devices. This is why setups often use a combination of ONT + Router to provide both signal conversion and network management.
