Metal boxes require a grounding screw, while non-metallic boxes require a grounding clip to ensure proper electrical safety. Grounding and Electrical Safety All distribution boxes must be properly grounded to prevent electrical shock and fire hazards. Continuous grounding is mandatory, and connections must comply with NEC 250.110 standards. This includes bonding to the building's grounding system and ensuring all metallic parts are electrically connected.
