

Requirements for the ground clearance of electrical distribution boxes in engineering projects



AI Overview

Electrical distribution boxes must have a minimum front clearance of 3 feet, side clearance of 30 inches or the width of the equipment, and a height clearance of at least 6.5 feet to comply with NEC standards.

Front Clearance The minimum working space in front of electrical distribution boxes should be 3 feet (900 mm) for systems up to 600V. This ensures safe access for maintenance, inspection, and emergency operations. The panel doors must be able to open fully to 90 degrees without obstruction, allowing personnel to work safely and avoid contact with live parts (NEC 110.26, NEC 408).

Side Clearance A minimum side clearance of 30 inches (760 mm) is required, or the width of the equipment if greater. This side-to-side working space allows safe lateral movement and access to the equipment for servicing or emergency intervention. For rows of equipment with live parts on both sides, the aisle width must be at least 4 feet, increasing with higher voltages.

Height Clearance The minimum headroom in front of the equipment must be 6.5 feet (≈ 2 meters) or the height of the equipment, whichever is greater. This clearance ensures that personnel can work comfortably without crouching and provides safe egress in case of an emergency.

Dedicated Space NEC 110.26 also requires dedicated space around electrical equipment. This space extends from the floor to 6 feet above the equipment or to the structural ceiling, whichever is lower. The dedicated space must be free of storage or other systems to allow safe access and ventilation.

Mounting Height Panelboards should generally be mounted no higher than 6 feet 7 inches (2 meters) above the floor to ensure accessibility. The working space must remain unobstructed.
