Recent Disruptions and Causes In recent years, multiple undersea cables near Yemen have been severed or damaged, causing latency spikes, slowdowns, and intermittent outages in countries including Saudi Arabia, Pakistan, India, and the UAE . The causes of these disruptions are debated:

- Security-related incidents:** Yemen's Houthi rebels have been accused of targeting ships and potentially cables as part of regional conflicts, including efforts to pressure Israel during the Gaza conflict . Some reports suggest the Houthis may have mapped cable routes and engaged in attacks that could inadvertently or deliberately damage infrastructure .
- Accidental damage:** The Red Sea is a busy shipping corridor, and cables can be severed by anchors, fishing gear, or collisions. Historical incidents, such as a cargo ship dragging its anchor, have caused accidental cable breaks .

Regional and Global Impact The severing of these cables has significant economic and operational consequences:

- Disruption of 25–30% of data traffic between Asia and Europe in some cases .**
